DETAIL OF THE SUBMISSION

1. KEY ISSUES FOR CONSIDERATION:

- 1.1 This report seeks the approval to the renewal of two collaboration agreements, in relation to Join Professional Standards and Joint Information Management, for periods of one year each.
- 1.2 The collaboration agreement in relation to Professional Standards was extended for a year in May 2017 (see Decision No C11-2017). At that time the Policing and Crime Act 2017 was introducing changes that would impact upon how complaints are dealt with. Because of that the year's extension was progressed. There have been delays nationally with the implementation of regulations to progress the statutory changes such that a further extension of a year is considered appropriate. Accordingly it is proposed to extend the collaboration agreement with Norfolk for a further year to 31 May 2019. In anticipation of the introduction of the statutory changes by that date the collaboration agreement will be fully reviewed.
- 1.3 As regards the collaboration agreement in respect of Joint Information Management it is considered appropriate also to extend the current collaboration agreement for a year until 31 July 2019. This is because there is a pending review of the Joint Information Management Department. This will also afford the opportunity for the new GDPR legislation to embed and enable a comprehensive review of the efficiency and effectiveness of the departmental structure to be carried out.
