

# Suffolk Police & Crime Commissioner's (PCC) Fund Data Report July 2024 – May 2025

## About the Suffolk PCC Fund

The Suffolk Police & Crime Commissioner's Fund provides grants of between £2,500 - £20,000 to support the work of voluntary, community and social enterprise organisations and parish councils that are delivering services to help make Suffolk a safer place to live, work, travel and invest in. Multi-year funding has also been available for organisations who have previously received a PCC grant and provided satisfactory monitoring.

A total of **£389,110** has been awarded from the Suffolk Police & Crime Commissioner's Fund through **23 grants** from July 2024 – May 2025, anticipated to make a meaningful impact on **15,352** beneficiaries, with an estimated cost per head of **£25.35** (these numbers are all taken from application form 'estimated' numbers as projects are yet to complete). The average grant size awarded was **£16,918**.

Below are details of all grants awarded in this period.



Some projects work across more than one local authority. In this case the local authority identified by the grantee as the primary one has been used.


Ipswich received the largest amount of funding (£189,173), although it should be noted that many of the Ipswich based organisations work beyond Ipswich. East Suffolk and West Suffolk also received considerable funding. The Grants awarded in Norwich and E Cambridgeshire were ring fenced for activity solely in Suffolk. In this period there were no projects funded in Babergh and Mid Suffolk.

## Geographical Spread of Grants Awarded

Please note that some of these projects operate in more than the one location shown on the map, or across Suffolk. This information is based on the primary area of delivery provided by each organisation, so although the amount awarded in the Ipswich area appears to be high, many of the organisations are based in Ipswich but provide support across the whole of Suffolk. This also applies to organisations based in other areas. The grant awarded in Norfolk was ringfenced for work across Suffolk, the grant awarded to E Cambridgeshire was ringfenced for Newmarket.

Amount awarded by Primary Beneficiary




Projects identify their primary beneficiary group but may work with more than one group. Projects working with Children and Young People as their primary beneficiaries received the highest percentage of funding awarded (58%) followed by Ex-offenders/offenders/At risk of offending (23%).

Projects working in the area of crime and safety received the highest percentage of the funding awarded in this period (33%). This was followed by rehabilitation of offenders (15%) and projects working on reducing antisocial behaviour (15%).

Every organisation awarded a grant via the PCC Fund provides an end of grant monitoring report and where appropriate for multi-year funding also an interim report on the specific activities and outcomes achieved through the grant period. These reports are reviewed by Suffolk Community Foundation and an Impact Report on their activities and impact is provided to the Office of the Police and Crime Commissioner.
