1	<b>Crucial Crew</b> - Delivered through Yr6 (9-10 yr old) to sensitise children to emergency and/or dangerous situations. Through partnership working the scenarios for this event include personal safety, alcohol and drug misuse, ASB, internet safety, healthy eating, first aid and road safety. By providing the schools with a teacher training pack it is hoped that learning around these topics can be continued in schools.	Helping young people & vulnerable adults	£2,500.00	<b>Qrt 1:</b> Dates have been selected and the venue booked for October 2013. Further discussions with partner agencies regarding content of scenarios and materials required are on-going. <b>Qrt 2:</b> 475 pupils from across Suffolk Coastal District attended crucial crew over the three day period. Initial feedback from partners, pupils and teachers was very positive. <b>Qrt 4:</b> Now planning delivery of crucial crew for October 2014.	To develop awareness on personal safety and provide a positive role model experience for many children lacking a positive family influence. To raise awareness of the consequences of offending behaviour and its affect on them and others.
2	<b>Y.B-Yz Project</b> - Commissioned to work through all Primary Schools aimed at Yr 5 (ages 8/9) pupils as a precursor to attending Crucial Crew in Yr 6. An interactive workshop using magic and story telling focusing on 'good citizenship' with themes to highlight the consequences of anti-social behaviour, bullying and peer-pressure and its effect on them and others. To provide a positive role model experience for many children lacking a positive family influence.	Helping young people & vulnerable adults	£2,995.00	<b>Qrt 2 &amp; 3:</b> Each workshop accommodates 70 students and following the workshop, a period of further follow up work is conducted back in the classroom utilising the project resource pack and it is at this point that the project's priorities are re-visited. 24 schools received the YBYz workshops for year 5 students.	To develop improved educational and awareness raising to young people in terms of the consequences of risk taking behaviour and providing positive role models, guidance and information, on the consequences of anti-social behaviour and its impact not only on the young people but those around them. Evaluation will include the number of schools attending, number of children attending and completion of post evaluation forms by teachers.
4	<b>DV Awareness Raising</b> - Publicity and materials for White Ribbon and other domestic awareness raising campaigns for adults and young people. Overall aim is to improve victim and public confidence and awareness. To include local delivery of Countywide project 'Abuse in a relationship is never ok'. To be delivered to young people of school age across the Waveney District through schools and youth establishments. To provide a positive role model experience through advice and information.	Helping young people & vulnerable adults	£1,000.00	CAAA developed and delivered a successful White Ribbon Campaign which ran from 25th November - 10th December. There were two public facing events in Leiston and Felixstowe, each event was attended by CAAA members and was supported by trained volunteers from Lighthouse womens aid. The forum also supports the Freedom Programme for victims of domestic abuse and has been instrumental in bringing Caring Dads into the Suffolk Coastal area.	Improve victim and public confidence through the delivery of events and campaigns. The number of schools attending and youth establishments engaged in activities targeted to respond addressing domestic abuse in relationships between young people.
5	<b>Intervention Officer (Suffolk Family Focus) funding</b> - To allow the Intervention Officer for this project access to an immediate pot of funding in order to meet the outcomes of the Troubled Families Scheme. In particular to address issues of crime, anti-social behaviour and social exclusion, engaging the whole family in a positive way centred around the families needs and issues by co-ordinating relevant support through a range of partner agencies and services.	Helping young people & vulnerable adults	£2,000.00	<b>Qrt 1:</b> The project is on-going. There is currently one Intervention Officer working currently with one Family that includes 7 individuals. <b>Qrt 2:</b> Some success in this case in terms of school attendance has increased among the family and more acceptance of partner agencies involvement. <b>Qrt 3:</b> SFF referrals being received from a number of agencies. <b>Qrt 4:</b> Six families being supported, two of which are intensive intervention.	Contributing to a reduction in anti-social behaviour crime statistics. Qualitative/anecdotal - family engagement and co-operation. Delivery of Family Intervention Plans, children back in education, adults in education/training.
6	<b>Police Cadets</b> - Started in October 2011 - the cadets have become an important part of the police extended family and are able to help progress current initiatives and enhance the way in which the Police capture and develop the skills and enthusiasm of young volunteers. During their cadetship they develop skills that will subsequently assist them in the competitive job market, encourage good citizenship, assist in making positive life choices and influence the shape of the community and police service of the future. It should be noted that all Police Officers involved in this scheme volunteer their time.	Helping young people & vulnerable adults	£1,000.00	<b>Qrt 1:</b> There are approximately 25 cadets in the Suffolk Coastal District area. At least 25% of these are considered 'at risk', vulnerable to either offending or becoming a victim of crime. A significant number of Cadets are assessed as being in the Autism Spectrum. <b>Qrt 2:</b>	Much of the evaluation will be judged on the number of young people who engage, in particular those who are considered at risk. It will of course be difficult to state what would have been the outcome for a particular at risk individual had they not engaged in the Cadet scheme, but will be able to state that whilst they were engaging they were playing a constructive role and learning life skills. This will be measured by the number of cadets engaged in the scheme, how long they stay engaged and the level and type of activity they engage in. This will be particularly relevant when activities have a community focus.
7	<b>Street Sport</b> - To encourage young people to participate in positive activities in Woodbridge, Felixstowe, Leiston and Rendlesham following reported Anti-social behaviour incidents during the summer months in these areas.	Helping young people & vulnerable adults	£1,500.00	<b>Qrt 2:</b> Two hour weekly activity session in Felixstowe, Woodbridge, Rendlesham and Leiston throughout the summer holidays. 120 different young people attended the sessions with a throughput of 563 over the 8 weeks. In the four areas that the activities were delivered in 2012, there were 53 reports of ASB in 2013, there were 23 so there was over a 50% decrease in ASB.	Reduce number of anti-social behaviour incidents reported during the summer months associated with young people in the identified hotspot areas. Improved quality of life for local communities.
8	<b>Kesgrave Activities</b> - Following low levels of anti-social behaviour, criminal damage and occasional arson in the Kesgrave area, working with Kesgrave Community Centre and Positive Futures to offer multi activities on Tuesday evenings, including street dance, football, dodge ball, boot camp, boxing or self defence.	Helping young people & vulnerable adults	£1,650.00	<b>Qrt 1:</b> Programme of activities commenced in September. <b>Qrt 2:</b> After a low key start, with additional promotion, numbers have slowly picked up to an average of 10 young people per week. Promotion has ranged from streetlife, the local high school, Kesgrave news and the local press. The young people are constantly spreading the word, and gradually numbers are increasing. Positive futures are undertaking additional promotion. <b>Qrt 3 &amp; 4:</b> A total of 26 sessions were delivered between September 2013 and finishing in April 2014. Fewer ASB incidents related to young people in Kesgrave have occurred in the 6 months that the project has been running.	To provide positive activities to help change behaviour. Reduce actual and perceived level of anti-social behaviour, criminal damage and occasional arson in the area by 15%. Improved quality of life for local communities.
9	<b>Saxmundham Activities</b> - Provision and delivery of diversionary activities for young people during the summer period in Saxmundham and surrounding villages as there is a known lack of youth activities to prevent anti-social behaviour and criminal activity. Youth workers providing activities will act as a mentor for young people and, as a captive audience, will provide information and advice on health and wellbeing to tackle some of the local issues/problems young people are experiencing.	Helping young people & vulnerable adults	£634.00	<b>Qrt 2:</b> The project gave young people something positive to do during the summer holidays reducing levels of ASB and youth related nuisance in Saxmundham Town, Brook Farm and Carlton Park. It also gave the youth workers the opportunity to meet with young people and provide subtle youth mentoring and tackle some of the local issues/problems young people are facing today in this locality which is recognised as an area of deprivation and social needs. 10	<b>Fearless</b> - Interactive theatre production covering the consequences of drinking alcohol, sexual health, personal safety and anti social behaviour. 11	<b>Detached Youth/Outreach Service in Felixstowe</b> - Taking youth services to the young people, out and about around the town and local hot spot areas known to us and the Police. Providing a safe environment at the youth hub, where young people who we engage with on the streets, can go to access further information, advice or guidance and signposted to specialist partner organisations where necessary.	Helping young people & vulnerable adults	£1,500.00	<b>Qrt 3 &amp; 4:</b> Sessions 1-2 evenings per week. Met up with 25 young people per session, the majority of who were 14-18 year olds. We used our minibus to go out onto the streets engaging with young people and building up trusting relationships. The minibus enabled us to go into the rural villages. Young people were encouraged to access other services available at our youth hub and to attend open access youth club sessions. Information, advice and guidance was given to young people on a number of specific issues such as drugs, alcohol, smoking and sexual health.	Provide a weekly detached youth session promoting harmony across age groups in the wider community and dispersing any potential ASB. Encourage young people to access youth hub service
12	<b>Licensing Training:</b> Training had been identified and requested by licensees. The 3 outcomes of the course are to assess and reduce the risk of violence in the workplace, identifies behaviour that may escalate towards violence and use appropriate measures to defuse the situation. 13	<b>Cycle Safety</b> - Joint partnership between Kesgrave SNT, KWMCC, Ipswich Bicycle Club and Kesgrave High School.
