- 2. This report details the reasons for requesting a 22A collaboration agreement from all forces in relation to the modern slavery police transformation fund programme.

DETAIL OF THE SUBMISSION

1. KEY ISSUES FOR CONSIDERATION:

- The Modern Slavery Transformation programme is a national project funded 1.1 by a Police Transformation Fund grant made to the PCC for Devon and Cornwall. The purpose of the programme is to enable the police service and other law enforcement agencies to develop an improved response to Modern Slavery. The programme was developed to address the recommendations to policing made within the independent report to the Home Office "Modern Slavery Act 2015 review: one year on".
- The programme is in its second year of operation and, in order to continue, a 1.2 Collaboration Agreement under s22A of the Police Act 1996 is required. Consultation has taken place with participating bodies through the national programme's Strategic Oversight Board. All forces, including Suffolk are now being asked to enter into the national agreement.
- 1.3 The collaboration agreement document references the need to adhere to the recent changes in protective marking, proposing that the new General Data Protection Regulations are adopted as part of the wider document. Personal data will be considered as 'Official Sensitive High' and sanitised data will be considered 'Official Sensitive Low'. The other key recommendation is that all data use should follow the National Data Protection Laws. All other aspects of the collaboration agreement are employed within the Constabulary currently and would not require any change.
