SUMMARY:

1. The Police and Crime Commissioner can commission services that:

- a) secure, or contribute to securing, crime and disorder reduction in Suffolk;
- b) are intended to help victims or witnesses of, or other persons affected by, offences and anti-social behaviour.

This is in accordance with the provisions in the Anti-Social Behaviour, Crime and Policing Act 2014. In applying this provision, the PCC will ensure that the services commissioned are also consistent with the Suffolk Police and Crime Plan 2017 – 2021.

- 2. The Suffolk Police and Crime Commissioner's Fund (previously Safer Suffolk Fund) was established in February 2014 to support organisations that can contribute to delivering the Police and Crime Plan objectives. The fund became operational on 1 April 2014.
- 3. A Grant Panel was established to consider applications and make recommendations on grant awards to the PCC who determines every grant award.
- 4. This decision paper sets out the recommendations following the twelfth grant panel. Nine applications are recommended for funding totalling £126,037.

RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that the PCC endorses the grants awarded through the Suffolk Police and Crime Commissioner's Fund.

- 2.5 Each panel features a specific theme, which is not exclusive but will take priority. The theme for applications submitted to the December Panel meeting was human trafficking, female genital mutilation, modern day slavery, honour based violence, hate crime and other offences committed out of sight or online. It was requested that applications support at least one of these key terms of reference:
 - To raise awareness with the general public and/or with victims.
 - To identify the issues within Suffolk and provide solutions to reduce the problems.
 - To run programmes that help victims escape difficult situations.
 - To link with the Code of Practice for Victims of Crime.
- 2.6 The following PCC decisions refer to previous awards:
 - PCC Decision 3-2015 grants awarded between 1 April and 31 December 2014 (Rounds 1 and 2)
 - PCC Decision 30-2015 grants awarded between 1 January and 31 March 2015 (Round 3).
 - PCC Decision 40-2015 grants awarded at the panel meeting of July 2015 (Round 4).
 - PCC Decision 8 2016 grants awarded at the panel meetings of November 2015 and February 2016 (Rounds 5 and 6).
 - PCC Decision 28 2016 grants awarded at the panel meeting of May 2016 (Round 7)
 - PCC Decision 47-2016 grants awarded at the panel meeting of September 2016 (Round 8)
 - <u>PCC Decision 13 -2017</u> grants awarded at the panel meeting of December 2016 and March 2017 (Round 9 and 10)
 - PCC Decision 30 2017 grant awarded at the panel meeting of September 2017 (Round 11)

3. PROPOSED GRANTS FOR FUNDING

- 3.1 Details of the nine grants proposed by the Grant Panel can be found in Appendix A.
- 3.2 Conditions, including monitoring arrangements, for each award are agreed between Suffolk Community Foundation on behalf of the PCC and the recipient.

4. FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS

4.1 The recommended grants from round 12 of the panel total £126,037.
