

# VICTIMS' COMMISSIONING

The PCC receives funding from the Ministry of Justice (MOJ) for the purposes of commissioning victims' services - including child sexual abuse, domestic abuse, and sexual violence. For 2024/25, we used MOJ and PCC funding to commission the following services for victims:

## **SUFFOLK POLICE & CRIME COMMISSIONER'S FUND**

The PCC Fund's £300k is managed by Suffolk Community Foundation and awarded to projects that contribute to the Police and Crime Plan. The Fund aims to support voluntary, community groups, charities, social enterprises, and community interest groups that are delivering services that help to address gaps in service. Grants are awarded 4 times a year via the PCC Fund Panel, which includes representatives from each Community Safety Partnership.
